2022 GOALS FOR STABLE HANDS: FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

In 2022 the Board of Directors plan to continue the strategic planning efforts throughout the organization, which the board agreed upon in February 2021. We voted to focus on the following areas:

- **People Policies:** Revolves around creating & evangelizing Stable Hands culture, making sure we have an Employee Handbook and policies to help the organization run smoothly.
- Animal Policies: Includes topics such as implementing exercise programs for the therapy horses, maintaining farm efficiencies, overseeing barn/arena maintenance, and assessing/improving horsemanship skills used in daily operations.

- EAGALA: Includes reviewing the Stable Hands Code of Ethics, safety parameters, HIPAA concerns, record keeping, and partnering with agencies to provide top notch therapeutic support to clients in our local and surrounding communities.

2021 COMPLETION OF THE FOREST LOOP TRAIL

We want to thank Mike Riter from <u>Trail Design Specialists</u>, <u>LLC</u> (Danielsville, Georgia) who built our forest trail the week of October 27th. He and his fiancé, Brigit, did such beautiful work!

The Forest Loop of the sensory trail was designed and constructed by Mike. The Forest Loop Trail is 8 feet wide and approximately 860 feet long. There is a 20 foot long boardwalk bridge with non-skid surface crossing a shallow creek into the wooded forest loop corner.

The peaceful trail turned out better than we imagined and has lots of opportunities for sensory stimulation. There are gentle inclines and curves, changes in background light from bright on the pasture side to filtered sunlight through the pines, scents of pine in the forest and scents of damp soil by the creek, sounds of horses' hooves on the wooden bridge, rustling wind in the tree tops and trickling water by the creek, chirping birds, and deer tracks to search for. The potential for creative use in lessons is endless!

The trail will be available for use by riders in our Therapeutic Riding program, and in our Mental Health and Equine Assisted Learning Programs. It will also be used for fundraiser events, such as a Halloween scavenger hunt and our annual lighted Snowshoe Hike and Wine Flight event.


This is only the first phase of the sensory trail construction. Our future plans include multiple individual sensory stations near the indoor arena and a specially designed trail for cart driving classes.


